What we learned

The birth of Jesus was good news! Jesus was not an ordinary baby. He is God's Son, sent to earth from heaven. Jesus came into the world to save people from sin and to be their King forever. With Thanksgiving coming, we can be most grateful that Jesus came.

Discussion Questions

- Mary and Joseph had to travel very far because Emperor Caesar was counting people in their hometowns. God had planned ahead for Jesus to be born in Bethlehem (the city of David) because Joseph was in King David's family tree.
 - Since God made an old prophecy about where the Messiah would be born come true, does that mean we can trust His promises to us?
 - Every room was full so Jesus was born where they kept the animals. Would you
 expect our King Jesus to be born in a castle or in a manger where animals eat?
 - If God can do something so important and so beautiful in such a stinky place, does that mean God is powerful enough to turn bad things into good things?
- 2. Last week we learned that Mary praised God after the angel told her about baby Jesus. Now we know that an angel also told shepherds in the fields about Jesus.
 - At first, the shepherds were scared of the angel, but then they visited baby Jesus
 and were so happy that they praise God and told others about Jesus. When
 something makes you happy, do you tell others about it? When you tell other
 people about Jesus, what do you say about Him?
 - Some wise men prepared gifts for Jesus. When the wise men found Jesus, they fell on their knees to worship Him. What are some ways that you worship Jesus?

Pray Together

he has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty.

He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy,

as he spoke to our fathers, to Abraham and to his offspring forever."

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
